ONLINE LEGAL NOTICES

Problem

The Alaska Courts Civil Rules Committee was concerned that the civil rule requiring "service by newspaper publication" had become:



Outdated



Ineffective



Too costly



Goals

Anticipated Goal is to notify the absent defendant or interested party in a more effective way than newspaper publication.

Secondary Goal is to save costs on ineffective publication practices.

Implementation

The Alaska Court System created a Google searchable legal notice website on its homepage

www.courts.alaska.gov/notices/index.htm

The rules now allow plaintiffs, in situations where there is an absent party, to post to the court's legal notice website:



Notices in change of name cases



Notices to absent or unknown parents in Child In Need of Aid cases



Notices to absent spouses in one spouse dissolution cases



Notices to absent parties in civil cases





The rules allow plantiffs in these situations to post to the Court's Legal Notice website. This online publishing capability is triggered by specific docket entries in the Alaska Court System called **CourtView™ CMS**.
